Consultation on Changes to Admissions Policy to recognise deprivation in SET Scores.	The changes to the Admissions Policy that recognise Social Deprivation have been agreed and passed by the Trust. Admissions Policy now active and applied.
Improve access to extended curriculum opportunities	£7,138 spent on the uptake of Extended Curricular opportunities.
